Musings on PSWA's 2026 St. David's Day Celebration

Honoring St. David

March 1 is traditionally recognized as the day of the passing of Wales' patron saint, St. David (Dewi Sant). This 6th-century bishop from Pembrokeshire is remembered not only for his leadership, but for his enduring message: **"Do the small things in life."** Around the world, Welsh communities honor his day with celebrations of Welsh culture.

A Celebration of Music

Our local celebration took place on February 28. Puget Sound Welsh Association President Joel Ware IV welcomed attendees and noted that our association has marked St. David's Day with musical gatherings for over a century.

This year's featured performer, **Paul Kawabori**, once again delighted the audience with his clear, expressive tenor voice. His program—spanning Welsh and American songs—blended hymns, folk music, and selections from across genres, each chosen for its storytelling power.

A special highlight was the participation of Paul's three sons—Kaleo, Kai, and Emet—who introduced pieces, shared insights, and performed alongside their father as well as on their own. Their presence, along with Paul's wife, brought a joyful and engaging spirit to the afternoon. Steven Luksan provided excellent accompaniment and led the audience in several beloved hymns.





Te Bach and Traditions

Following the performance, guests were invited to a **te bach** (“small tea”)—which was anything but small. A generous spread of sandwiches, fruit, and sweets, including Welsh cakes, was enjoyed by all. Many thanks to Ellen Webber, Jill Moore, Laura Lovell, and the many contributors who made the table so abundant.

The festivities continued with the annual **limerick contest**, where winners were decided by enthusiastic applause, continuing a tradition led by Ellen Webber and begun years ago by Alan Upshall.

A Bit of Welsh Luck

The raffle drawing brought laughter and suspense. PSWA Board Treasurer, Christopher Mooreddall had traveled to Wales this past year and thoughtfully assembled a wonderful basket of Welsh items. After several attempts failed to find a winner present, our youngest attendee—a seven-month-old in Welsh costume—was invited to draw, though even she could not conjure a winner! At last, a 27-month-old participant selected the winning ticket... belonging to his father. Truly a memorable moment!

A Merry “Noson Lawen”

The afternoon concluded with a **noson lawen**—a traditional “merry gathering” of informal performances. Under the guidance of Laura Lovell, attendees shared songs, poetry, stories, and music. It was a wonderful reminder that Welsh culture thrives through participation.

Many guests embraced the spirit of the day, wearing rugby shirts or sporting leeks and daffodils. The colors of Wales were everywhere—and it was even rumored that dragons made an appearance! Surrounded by beautiful daffodil arrangements (thank you, Gwen Weinert), the afternoon passed in warmth and good company. Join Us For Landmark Welsh Day Celebration: A Call For Volunteers

At one point in its history, Black Diamond had a population of 30,000 people—fully one-third of whom were Welsh-speaking. The Black Diamond Historical Society (BDHS) has long honored this heritage by sponsoring Welsh Day on the first Saturday in June each year for more than 30 years. The Society first invited PSWA to present a program in 1999.

This year, Saturday, June 6, will be especially significant, as three major anniversaries will be celebrated: the 250th anniversary of the founding of the United States, the 50th anniversary of the Black Diamond Historical Society, and the 33rd anniversary of Welsh Heritage Day. <https://tinyurl.com/efzjkpha>

As of this writing, the Historical Society reports that a number of exciting activities are in the planning stages. These include a statewide essay contest, a large parade possibly featuring participants in period costume, national flags of the USA, Wales, and other countries, a fife and drum corps, an antique car and truck show, and displays highlighting the rich history of mining life.

A marketplace will stretch from the museum to the bakery, featuring booths from various organizations showcasing information and products. **PSWA has been invited to consider hosting a Welsh booth**, which could offer Welsh goods, share information about Wales and our Association, and possibly include musical or children's activities—both of which would be warmly welcomed.

At the Board meeting on April 29, the members agreed to explore hosting a booth. However, this opportunity will only become a reality if members step forward now to help make it happen.

We urgently need volunteers to plan, organize, and staff this effort. Without sufficient support in the coming weeks, PSWA may not be able to participate in this landmark event.

June 6 is fast approaching—now is the time to step forward and help ensure Welsh heritage is proudly represented. Your participation will make the difference. **Come be a part of it!**

She has generously opened her home for gatherings, taken on countless behind-the-scenes tasks—from Priestess of the White Tablecloths (Wash! Bleach! Starch! IRONING!) to serving as an officer on the PSWA Board – and consistently encouraged member participation with not a few personal phone calls. In addition, she has mentored and guided new boards and represented the Association through her service on the board of the North American Festival of Wales. Her energy and sense of humor have been true gifts to the community.

In accepting the award, Evans expressed her gratitude and emphasized the collective spirit behind these accomplishments. "One person cannot achieve anything alone," she said. "Contributions of historical members provided our foundation and together we have done 'the little things.'" She concluded by wishing the Society continued success in the years ahead.

Meet Your Board – Jill Moore

Jill Moore is our newest board member, a convivial and hard-working person who kindly lets us use her Lakewood home as the ideal place to enjoy our summer picnic. She is reliable help for our other PSWA events. Jill is the mother of our Treasurer, Chris Mooreddrall.

Jill's grandparents wanted a fresh start in life when they immigrated from Wales to America in 1900, and became farmers in Eagle, Wisconsin. They joined a Welsh-speaking community, where Jill's mother was born. Later, they moved to Great Lakes, Illinois, where Jill's mother married and Jill was born. Welsh continued to be her family's first language.

At the age of seven, Jill, three older siblings, and her mother moved to Seattle. She attended Rainier Beach High School and went on to work as a nurse and for Fred Astaire Dance Studios, was a vocalist in a band, and got her CNA certification – all before marriage.

At age 21, she met Terry, her husband-to-be. For their first date, he took her flying to see the July 4th fireworks. From that first date to their wedding on October 3, 1975, was just three short months—it was written in the stars! Jill remembers him as funny, talented, smart, kind, and generous. They were married for 47 years, and she describes him as her best friend and a wonderful father to their children, Chris, Colin, and Cathy.

During their marriage, Jill was a full-time mother who often worked at Terry's company, served as a PTA vice - president and a fundraiser for and various charities. In addition, she hosted foreign high school students from many different countries.

She remains active in the International Plastic Modelers Society, the North West Scale Model Association, and the Galaxy Exiles Sci-Fi Club. Terry was a master model maker (static aircraft), and Jill has received awards for her own contributions to the craft, including recognition at the national level.

Jill became a PSWA board member because she wants to deepen her Welsh roots. When she visits Wales, she feels a sense of belonging. "I want to share my heritage and the rich culture of Cymru in so many ways – all the beauty and friendliness of the land and people."

Modern Welsh Musical Artist Highlight: Ren

Ren Eryn Gill is a 35-year-old singer-songwriter, musician, rapper, producer, actor, and director from **Dwyran, Anglesey**. His sound is a gritty, genre-blending mix of **rap, rock, funk, punk, R&B, indie, and pop**—likely not what you might expect from a modern Welsh artist.

He studied music at Bath University, where he began busking and formed the band **Trick the Fox**. His talent quickly gained attention, and in 2010 he was signed to a Sony sub-label.

Ren’s breakthrough came in **2022** with “**Hi Ren,**” a powerful nine-minute piece structured as a dialogue between two sides of his mind—one vulnerable, the other dark and self-critical. The song reflects his battles with **Lyme disease**, mental health struggles, and difficult experiences with the medical system, blending acoustic guitar, rap, and theatrical performance.

His first album, ***Freckled Angels*** (2015), was a tribute to his friend Joe Hughes, who tragically died in 2010. In memory of his friend, Joe, Ren also supported the **Royal National Lifeboat Institution (RNLI)** in Anglesey, raising an impressive **£21,000** for the Beaumaris crew. A restaurant in Menai Bridge, **Freckled Angel**, also honors his friend’s memory.

Ren’s health journey has been complex – including enduring sickness in 2012 where he became unable to work, spending 23 hours in bed daily. Initially misdiagnosed with bipolar disorder, chronic fatigue, and depression, he was later correctly diagnosed with Lyme disease. Years of ineffective treatment contributed to further challenges, including PTSD and stress-induced psychosis. In 2017, he became a spokesperson for **Lyme Disease UK**.

In **2023**, he released ***Sick Boi***, exploring both recovery and ongoing struggles. More recently, in **2025**, he released ***Sick Sick Soul (Vol. 1)*** with **The Skinner Brothers**, and in 2026 began releasing singles from ***Vincent’s Tale***, continuing his signature mix of styles.

Seattle's 1964 Spring Festival of Daffodils

In March 1964, over one million daffodils decorated downtown Seattle during the city's **Spring Festival of Fun**, a week-long celebration coordinated by the Central Association of Seattle. The festival featured entertainment, exhibits, plays, free rides, a children's circus, and other attractions throughout the week.

Opening day, March 13, brought 44-degree weather. Thirteen Daffodil Princesses from Puyallup were present at Westlake Mall to distribute flowers, and music was part of the festivities.

Mrs. Carol Powers, Festival of Fun hostess, staffed an information booth at the Mall on "Waterfront Day," which included a fireboat performance and the Coast Guard cutter *Wachusett*.

The Frederick & Nelson store exhibited 75,000 daffodils, and approximately half a million more were displayed in other department stores and offices. Special care instructions were provided to ensure the flowers remained in good condition throughout the festival.

The festival also recognized Seattle's approximately 35,000 career women, who were presented with bouquets and corsages. Ten-cent bus rides, a few free ride days, music performances, and various shows and exhibits were offered daily. One small Seattle establishment ordered 10,000 daffodils to distribute to customers.

Music was featured throughout the festival, including performances by pianists on some of the oldest pianos in the city. As daylight extended, downtown retail establishments remained open until 10 p.m., including square dancing and special performances honoring women.

The festival included **International Day**, with performances from multiple countries, as well as an arts and crafts show with photographers. An additional 700,000 daffodils were brought in to support these events. At the close of the festival, many stores offered daffodils to the public. The City of Seattle also incorporated daffodil imagery into billing statements during this period.



Many participants and visitors were of Welsh descent. Women were honored at a candlelight dinner in the Grand Ballroom of the Olympic Hotel, which was decorated with thousands of daffodils combined with shamrocks.

The Welsh Americans of 1776

How many men signed the Declaration of Independence? Fifty-six. And how many were of Welsh descent? A surprising sixteen, which made them the largest ethnic group present at our nation's birthday. The most famous of these founding fathers were Francis Lewis, Button Gwinnett, and Thomas Jefferson, but each person gave their all to make America free of the rule of kings.

Why were they in America, and where did they get their revolutionary ideals? Mostly they or their families had emigrated from Wales with organized religious groups (Quakers, Baptists, and Methodists) whose worship and beliefs did not conform to those of the Church of England, thereby receiving abuse, hardship, and punishments. There were few economic opportunities in Wales, and famines and an oppressive British government made life difficult. In the American colonies, they could speak Welsh and study new ideas.

These Welsh settlers truly understood they wanted freedom from political and religious tyranny. Many Welsh Americans fought in the War of Independence, often losing their lives and fortunes. This Fourth of July, let us remember their great sacrifice with thanks and vow to remain free people for another 250 years.

Hidden Dragons in America's Founding at 250

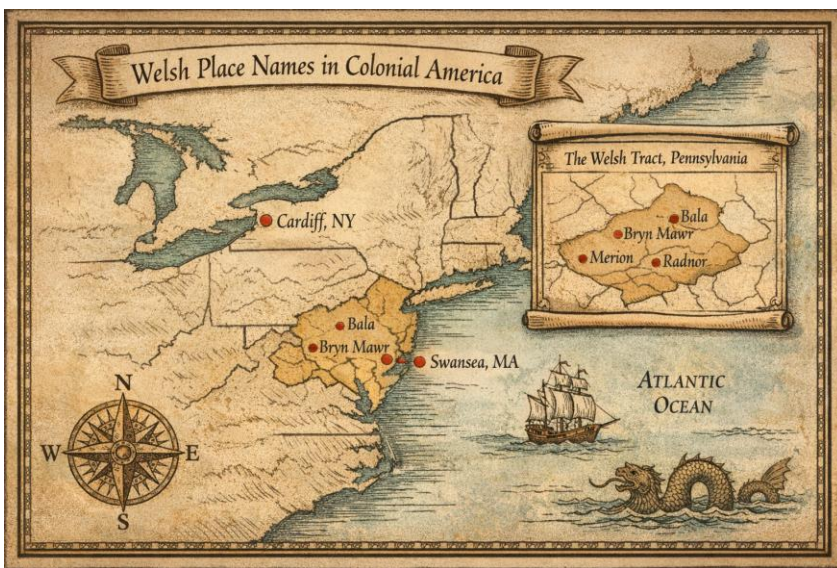

As the United States approaches its 250th anniversary, the contributions of Welsh settlers can be seen not only in revolutionary action but in the intellectual and civic foundations of the nation. In Pennsylvania's early "[Welsh Tract](#)," leaders like [David Lloyd](#) (Montgomeryshire) and [Rowland Ellis](#) (Meirionnydd) helped shape colonial governance, promoting legal fairness and representative institutions rooted in Quaker ideals.

Welsh influence also extended into education and religion. [Morgan Edwards](#) (Carmarthenshire) helped found Rhode Island College—now [Brown University](#)—advancing higher education in the colonies while [Evan Evans](#) (Montgomeryshire) served Welsh-speaking communities in Pennsylvania, fostering literacy and social cohesion.

While no single Welsh figure dominated the colonial stage, Welsh settlers collectively shaped early America through technical expertise, industrial skills, agricultural knowledge, and civic leadership. From ironworkers – later exemplified by [David Thomas](#) of Cadoxton, Wales, who became known as the *Father of the American Anthracite-Fired Iron Industry* – to slate and coal miners, and skilled artisans, as well as pioneering farmers, clergy, and educators, they helped build thriving settlements, advance literacy and religious life, and establish governance structures—laying the foundations of a prosperous, functioning society that would ultimately become the United States of America.

For those of Welsh heritage, this legacy is a point of quiet pride—and for others, a surprising reminder of how deeply Welsh voices helped shape America's story. To explore further, organizations like the [Welsh Society of Philadelphia](#) and the [National Library of Wales](#) offer rich resources into this shared history.
