<u>The Retirement of Mr. Rhys Jenkins, the ex-member for Fochriw</u> Mr. Rhys Jenkins is the son of Mr. Thomas Jenkins, who was an official at the No. 1 Colliery for 27 years. Mr. Jenkins died in August last year, but his wife, Ann, is still living. Mr. Rhys Jenkins was born

at Dowlais, but attended Fochriw Board School until he was twelve, at which time he went to work in the Fochriw Collieries. However, he attended technical classes and obtained two certificates in Mining under the Science and Art Department. In 1895, he commenced preaching in Carmel Congregational Chapel, and eventually, went in for a course of theological studies at the Gwynfryn Academy, Ammanford, and the Memorial College, Brecon. Since the completion of his college course, he has been ministering to the various Welsh and English churches of his denomination almost every Sunday. He still holds the post of deacon and corresponding secretary at Carmel, where he is held in high esteem. In June 1910, Carmel Church honoured him by ordaining him to the full work of the ministry. He is also an active member of the Welsh Congregational North Glamorganshire Association, and a member of the executive. As a member of the Forward Movement Committee, he was selected to read a paper at the conference of the Association at Horeb, Penydarren, in October, 1908, on the subject 'Jesus of Nazareth, Social Reformer.' He also preached the missionary sermon at the meeting of the Association held at Elim, Cwmdare, in October, 1910.

Mr. Jenkins has taken an active and painstaking concern in the welfare of the Parish of Gellygaer, and was elected to represent Fochriw on the Council in 1904. On the formation of the Gellygaer Urban District Council in 1908, he was elected as one of the members of the same ward. He has held office until his recent retirement, much to the regret of his colleagues, and the public, who have observed how honestly, sincerely, and faithfully he has discharged his duties as councillor. Besides acting on various Council committees of the Sewerage Board, Mr. Jenkins has been a member of the Gellygaer School Managers for four years, and did his utmost for a new infants' school at Fochriw, and a new school at Pantywaun, which he opened in 1908. Being a good Welsh scholar, he held the position of teacher in Welsh under the Glamorgan Education Committee for several years. An ardent supporter of the good side of the national eisteddfod, Mr. Jenkins has acquired a good reputation as an essayist, and gained many prizes. In politics he is a staunch Liberal, and has been the Liberal Registration Agent for the district of Fochriw for several years. By the retirement of Mr. Rhys Jenkins, the district has lost the services of a faithful representative. Mr. Jenkins has always had the courage of his opinions - he was not a party to be bargained with. If a thing presented itself as wrong or impudent, Mr. Jenkins was dead against it. Fochriw always had one to voice its needs in him, and he deserves well of Fochriw.

<u>Ambulance Inspection at Fochriw: Opening of the Ambulance Station</u> The annual inspection of the Dowlais corps of the St. John Ambulance Brigade, comprising Dowlais, Bedlinog and Fochriw, took place on the mountainside on Thursday evening, last week. The inspecting officer was Mr. Herbert Lewis, Cardiff, Deputy Commissioner, No. 11 District. The Fochriw Division was in the charge Supt. W. J. Ballard. The surgeons were also present. Prior to the inspection, the Dowlais and Fochriw Divisions marched from the Ambulance Station to Pentwyn, where they were joined by the Bedlinog Division. Headed by the Pontlottyn Silver Band, under Mr. Wm. Mantle's conductorship, they paraded the streets of the village, and from thence marched to the mountainside, appropriate march tunes being played en route. After the inspection, a procession was formed, and headed by the Band, marched to the new Ambulance Station. The Station is situated in a convenient place near the colliery. It is very commodious and excellently built. It consists of a coach-house, and a

first-aid dressing room, containing all the requisites for dressing any injury. It is beautifully fitted out with baths, bowls and hot and cold supply. The rooms are well finished and furnished with table, chairs and forms for the convenience of those who accompany the injured. The room has been built to afford the greatest amount of light possible, which is essential for treating injuries. A very large number of people congregated which shows the keen interest taken in the proceedings.

The opening ceremony was presided over by Dr. E. Davies. He welcomed Mr. J. H. Jones who was to open the Ambulance Station. Mr. J. Bevan, manager, Fochriw, in presenting Mr. J. H. Jones with a key to open the Station, stated that in looking at the new ambulance car, it reminded him of the contrivances used in the past for carrying the injured to his home. He remembered a time when a wooden door was used, then came the stretcher, then the litter, and now the beautiful car, which meant greater comfort to the injured on the journey home. Today, accidents were less serious and less frequent as in the past, but still, his desire was to see them diminish. Even greater care, by workman and officials, was essential. It gave him great pleasure to hand over to Mr. Jones the beautiful silver key, suitably inscribed, with which to open the station.

At this juncture, the rain descended in torrents, which greatly marred the proceedings, but notwithstanding the terrific downpour, Mr. J. H. Jones delivered an excellent address. He said that it was a great pleasure to see so many of his Fochriw friends again, friends with whom he had lived for so many years. He could remember the time when the ambulance members carried on their drill on the railway siding beside the coal-weighing machine. Things had improved since then, for now they had an excellent hall. Nine tenths had been subscribed by the workmen towards the purchase of one of the cars. There was much overcrowding which caused them to build the houses, and they had come to urge the Council to grant the certificates of habitation, since many had given notice to leave their present homes, and such notices were about to terminate. A second member of the deputation, Mr. Davies, said that in his house there were only three rooms wherein six persons slept. His elder girl had to sleep out. Mr. Payne stated that the members of the building club were not responsible for the encroachment. The Clerk stated that the Council's remedy was to prosecute for a breach of the bye-laws, but they could not withhold the certificate of habitation. Council members were divided on the action necessary, five supporting a resolution to enforce the bye-laws, and seven supporting a proposal that the Council take no action in the matter. It was decided that the matter should go before the Local Government Board.
