Slipped in Front of Tram: Young Fochriw Miner's Fate "This is one of those cases where there is no evidence to show exactly how the deceased got under the journey of trams. The position where the body was found makes it perfectly clear that six trams passed over him and that the seventh stopped on top of him. The only thing that I can submit is that the deceased must have slipped while walking in front of the trams, and could not recover himself in time to get clear." These remarks were made by the Deputy Coroner, Capt. W.F.T. James, when he conducted an inquest on Ronald Baden Williams, aged 19, of South Tunnel, Cwmbargoed, who died at Merthyr General Hospital on February 28 as a result of an accident at Ogilvie Colliery, where he was employed as a rider and shackler. The lad's

father, William Henry Williams, said his son was well experienced with this type of work, and had been in charge of a journey of trams before. Dr. Islwyn Davies, house surgeon at Merthyr General Hospital, gave evidence on the injuries that the deceased had suffered. Frederick Williams, 4. Martin-street, Fochriw, said the accident occurred about 8.45 p.m. He had noticed some trams going up at a walking pace and Williams was walking between the rails about four or five yards in front of the leading tram. There was sufficient room at some places to enable him to walk on the left hand side of the rails. He thought that the journey had gone up too high, and after shouting to Williams, he went up and found him lying with his head towards the dump. There was no fall of roof, and there was no obstruction to the rails. Williams was the only man in charge of the trams, and it was a regular practice of his to walk in front of the trams. Thomas Jones, a colliery rider of 7, Brynteg-street, Fochriw, said it was a regular practice to walk in front of the trams. In answer to Mr. G. Jenkins, H.M. Inspector of Mines, Jones said that Williams had an electric cap lamp worn on his safety helmet. The lamp, which was still lit, was lying between the rails close to Williams. Evidence was also given by Glanmor Thomas, a colliery haulage driver. The Coroner returned the following verdict: "Death was due to multiple injuries accidentally received when run over by a journey of trams while working underground."

<u>Bargoed Police Court: Fochriw Linguist</u> Rufus Dummitt, aged 25, collier, Fochriw, was fined 10 shillings for having used obscene language in Station Road, Bargoed, on February 8. He did not appear, but sent a letter to the court pleading guilty.

The bride, who wore a blue coat and dress trimmed with light blue, with hat and shoes to tone, with a spray of pink carnations, and carried an astrakan muff, was given away by her brother, Chief Petty Officer R.E. Bisheys, R.N. The best man was Mr. Wm. Pugh, Abercynon, of the Welsh Guards. The reception was held at the home of the bride. The couple will make their future home in Chelsea.

At the time he had a knife in one hand, and a loaf of bread in the other. Lewis was like a raving madman, swinging his arms in the air. He did not know that the knife struck Lewis. It could only have happened whilst Lewis was swinging his arms. His nephew did not strike Lewis with a poker, and he did not strike Lewis in any way. John Adams Jones, nephew of Evan John Jones, said that he had been discharged from the Army because his eyesight was defective. Whilst at his uncle's house, John Lewis arrived and attacked him. He picked up a poker to defend himself. Lewis wanted to fight him. He was using filthy language and said he would half kill him. The Stipendiary concluded that the cause of the whole trouble was John Lewis. Both John Adams Jones and Evan John Jones were not guilty. Lewis would be fined £1 for assaulting John Adams Jones.

No Swimming for Fochriw Pupils: Director's Reply to Gellygaer Group When Gellygaer Group of Managers met on Monday, Mr. Hector Bolwell (who presided0 read a letter from the Director of Education for Glamorgan, in reply to a letter from the Group, requesting that children attending Fochriw, Penybank and Pantywaun Schools, should be afforded the same facilities at Bargoed swimming baths as those enjoyed by other schools in the group. The letter stated: "I have made inquiries and find it is not possible to arrange for senior scholars attending the named schools to receive swimming instruction at Bargoed baths on account of the fact that: (1) the baths are already fully occupied by other scholars from the authority's elementary, secondary and junior technical schools in the area; (2) it would be difficult to arrange for the conveyance of these extra pupils at present; (3) there are no teachers on the staffs of the named schools who can swim and can give instruction to the pupils in this subject. I am sorry to say, for your information, that the facilities already granted to most of the other schools in the group to which you refer will shortly have to cease, as the Gellygaer omnibus department have been notified by the regional transport commissioner that supplies of fuel can no longer be granted for the purpose of conveying children for swimming instruction." Coun. Sam Lewis and Coun. W.J. Kedward both felt that the excuses were lame ones, but conceded there was no point in pursuing the matter further this summer. Gallantry in Blitz: Fochriw Man Honoured The many friends of Mr. Howell Thomas (formerly of Fochriw) who has been living and working in Birmingham for the past seven years, will be pleased to learn that he has recently been presented with a gold medal and a certificate of honour, signed by the Prime Minister, the Right Hon. Winston Churchill, at a public gathering held at Birmingham recently. The presentation was made by Lord Dudley, regional commissioner, who had drawn the attention of Mr. Herbert Morrison (Minister of Home Security) "to an act of brayery performed by Mr. Thomas on the night of Nov. 19 last year, when Birmingham was being heavily bombed," in the Lord Mayor's own words. Mr. Thomas did particularly good service in releasing victims trapped by the explosion of a land mine, in rendering first aid, and later did excellent work by dealing with incendiary bombs. "I must confess to some disappointment that the award did not reach a higher level, but I am sure you had no thought for any reward when you so gallantly set about the rescue of injured persons trapped in debris," declared a high official.
