GARETH CRWYS WILLIAMS.

The quotation on the funeral service sheet was "The day thou gavest, Lord, is ended". What a brilliant day it was, and how swiftly ended, before any of the shades of night clouded it. Born at Brynmawr in 1907, Gareth Crwys Williams was educated at Mill Hill School and read Classics at Cambridge; he had a Greek class in the then Llangollen Grammar School to which he was appointed Headmaster in 1937 and which he left in 1944 to become headmaster at Penarth. From 1947 to the present time he was H.M.I. successively in the Counties of Lincoln, Worcester, and Salop, coming to live ever nearer to Llangollen, the place chosen for not-to-be realised retirement. These appointments were punctuated by educational services abroad: assistant Secretary to U.N.E.C.O. (1950-52), Chief Inspector in English in Iraq (1957-58) and again lately a briefer inspection in Cyprus and Malta. His was an adventurous and forward-looking mind. Before he left Llangollen in 1944, he had perfected a scheme to make our School comprehensive, a new idea only tried in Anglesey at that time. It was then turned down by the L.E.A. who afterwards adopted it. Like his famous father, Archdruid Crwys, he was a keen cricketer - his short and fatal illness struck him at the County Cricket Dinner - He was excellent company in any circle, but especially amongst the young, which made him so delightful and so loved a father and grandfather. Heddwch i'w lwch.

The funeral took place on Thursday morning, March 12th. The Parish Church was full for the service conducted by the Vicar, the Rev. J. Ivor Rees, assisted by the Rev. J.K. Hughes, with Miss Gwyneth Davies at the organ. It opened with the hymn "Arglwydd, arwain trwy'r anialwch". The metrical version of the 21st Psalm was sung and the last hymn was "He who would valiant be". The retiring collection to be divided equally between the Church Restoration and Llangollen Hospital, amounted, with further donations, to £100.

The family mourners were Mrs. Frances Crwys-Williams (widow); Mrs. Ann MacKinnon (daughter); Mr. & Mrs. David Crwys-Williams and Mr. John Crwys-Williams (sons); Mr. & Mrs. Hay (brother-in-law) and Mrs. M. Matthews (sister).

The interment was in Llantysilio New Cemetery, where a few early Spring flowers struggled to raise their heads through the snow. Two lovely crosses of flowers and a colourful posy were placed on the grave from his wife, his children and the grand-children, and there were also other floral tributes.

The bearers were members of Oswestry and Llangollen Rotary Clubs.

His mother Grace died while he was in Iraq - personally buried with King Beisul.

DINAS BRAN. Mr. D.J. Edwards, Aelybryn, Geufron, who had previously offered personal help in the repair of Dinas Bran to the U.D.C., wrote in February to Prince Charles, who passed his letter on to the Ministry of Works. They replied stating they had the matter in hand, and that work would start as soon as weather permitted; and they thanked him for his interest. So there is hope!

THE LATE JOHN IORWERTH ROBERTS.

The sudden passing of Mr. Iorwerth Roberts last Tuesday morning shocked and grieved the whole community. He came to live in Llangollen about 35 years ago while teaching at Penycae, and later became headmaster of Pentredwr Primary School which he loved dearly and often called "A small Family". Among his many activities relating to Wales and the Welsh Language, he was Financial Secretary of Undeb Cymry Fydd, and, for 10 years was secretary of the Llangollen Welsh Literary Society. He found great interest in Local History and gave much pleasure to many people by his series of lectures during the Winter months. In 1961 he became Joint Secretary of the Llangollen International Eisteddfod after many years as secretary of the Finance Committee. He will be greatly missed by officials and committee members for his efficient and conscientious manner, also by his fellow townspeople and visitors to the Eisteddfod. His services as deacon and secretary in Rehoboth Chapel are incalculable and he was recently engaged in planning the consideration of the unity among the Welsh chapels in the town. Many local residents will remember with affection the warm hospitality they received in Isgaer from Mr. Roberts and his first wife, who died so suddenly in 1965, and then from his second wife whom he married such a short time ago. Our deep sympathy is extended to her, and to his daughter, Mrs. Llinos Neale, and his son-in-law Mr. Gwyn Neale and his little grandchildren whom he loved so dearly.

The funeral took place on Friday 20th March in Rehoboth Chapel and was conducted by the Rev. J. Roger Roberts, assisted by Rev. I. Lloyd, Ruabon; Rev. T. Gwyn Jones, Fwllglas; Rev. Aled Williams, Mochdre; Rev. J. R. Roberts, Penycae, and Rev. J. Ivor Rees. The organist was Mr. Lloyd Rowlands. Rev. Meurig Roberts was present, but unable to take part because of his illness.

Interment was in Llantysilio, where Rev. H. Gwynfa Roberts, Aberporth (a nephew of the deceased) assisted Rev. Roger Roberts in a short Service.
