13 May. Carrying on as usual.

Special Malaria patients from 5043

49 & 29 transferred for special treatment  
60 in all. Meet an old Aberystwyth  
Jenkins. Fairly busy all day.  
Inspection by D.M.L of 4 men.

14 Another fine day. Mail small.

Letter from V.J. Minna & Annie & Phil.  
Wants to pass Chas. Afternoon off.  
Visit 660 Coy where a Review is given  
by the Camouflage. Fairly good  
on the whole. Yet how empty.  
Still it served to relieve the  
monotony of our life here.

15 Discharge. Fairly busy today.  
Doing fairly well so far: nothing gone  
wrong.

16 Easy day: off this afternoon.  
Rumors of another change.

17 Discharge. A man inspected  
by Colonel who made a foolish  
speech. What can we expect from  
the army when such scoundrels  
are lead. Talk of Russianism  
it is rampant in our mid at.  
We shall have to fight this demon  
after the war is over. O England  
who dost slay thy prophets!  
Am told that I shall soon be left ye Gods!

18 Busy morning: all goes well.  
afternoon off. Sleep all the time.  
Prest & Davis call. Prest a  
talker as ever.

19 Sunday. Glorious day: But th  
for the Sunday of Wales! How long  
to be at home with the folk who spend  
it in the good old fashioned way.  
I am at work. Before me across  
the road are officers & clerks

laughing & giggling playing tennis.  
Yesterdays in France the boys are  
bedding to death for what?

O tempore! O mores!

Still through the darkness of human  
folly I see the glorious dawn  
of the day of the Son of man.

Wrote to Mabel, albeit with a  
sad note. I could not help it.  
It was my mood.

Shall go to Service tonight when  
I hope my drooping spirit shall be  
revived. I hope the padre will not  
indulge in any of his gallery play  
as he did last Sunday, when  
he evidently spoke under a mistaken  
conception of the kind of men whom  
he had for a congregation.

Am told that my promotion to the  
honorable rank of Lance corporal

in this Major's company will be  
an accomplished fact. I hate  
the idea. Everything that pertains  
to the army is hateful to me. Yet  
what am I to do under the cir-  
cumstances. Discretion is the  
greatest of virtues. A man is a fool  
to count trouble. One gets that  
easy enough in the army.  
It seems that more "A" men will  
soon be transferred to the Infantry.  
I wonder when my turn will come.  
Yet I trust & believe I shall be saved  
the trouble of fighting the army.  
I have much to be thankful  
for. The hand of Providence is  
clearly evident in my life. I  
bow to Him gratefully.

"What do I lack?" The subject acc. to the speaker was The Perfect Manhood.  
Manhood has 3 sides - physical, mental & spiritual. These 3 are essential to perfect manhood. By spiritual the speaker meant the refined in nature - the glow. This impossible without religion. If a man has no respect for God & his worship he neither has respect for the good in man. So religion ~~reaps~~ is absolutely essential to a perfect manhood. Speaker severely criticised after the meeting - unjustly to my mind. The fact that men wear the cloak of religion & lack the "glow" does not affect the argument that a man who is truly devoted to recognise their divine also recognise goodness in man. The cloak is not the glow nor is it religion.

20. Monday. Glorious day. nothing of importance doing. After noon off. Read Quo Vadis. Walk as far as the Y.M.C.A. with G. Stork. 10 men detailed for Infantry among the Queen & Dallas. Saluting drill <sup>done</sup> 21 Glorious day! Salute for 10 minutes off. Why waste time with such trifling things? Why wonder that we are so slow? Saluting is more essential than to find away out of the chaos. This is rank militarism. N.C.O charged with damage is let off. If I happened to pass an officer without saluting him it would mean 17 Days C. B. What fool we are. Rec'd. 2 letters from Hugh & one from Rachel. 22 ~~Wednesday~~ morning: Saluting drill for 10 minutes fairly busy morning: Off for the afternoon. Thunder storm. Read Quo Vadis. 10 men leave for Infantry Training, 10 arrive to replace them. 10 men go for Rest - every week to Karabourov.

23 Nothing of importance today. Dyer.

I find myself belonging to the hateful class of N.C.O's; having been appointed H/C/S with pay with effect from 6 May 18.

How I hate! Wish I had never counted myself under the circumstances what could I do. So far all goes well; but when I shall have to be responsible for Subs etc I am afraid things will go to pieces. Preparation for H.S.

24 Discharge: fairly busy. Pay parade. Rec small parcel from Shergill with 9k Test. from Mrs Vadi.

So for a stroll alone.

25 Saturday: busy today: several board etc. S.S. Davie ~~treacherously~~ boarded & passed. Have great surprise - my old chum Rogers calls to see me. He is now on H.S. Asmara Castle - has been here 6 times. I was

glad to see him. He looked well & smiled a of glee. Meet one of the Welsh <sup>Brave</sup> Unit who has recently joined us. Chester Romeo at B.M.T.D. I suppose it was a good show. But I can't say I enjoyed myself. Make up was good, some of the singing splendid & great deal of humor but there were much vulgar suggestion running through the whole show as is generally in the case in these concerts. It is such a pity that no concert given by ~~as~~ two soldiers is complete without the vulgar. It is appalling that all junior officers & others enjoy these suggestions. I blush with shame for my fellows when I think of this. Every sense of the beautiful & refined is sacrificed today to suit the low & vulgar taste of the mob.

Had a splendid dinner! Concert naturally  
disappointing: Vulgar clowns said a very long.

C.O. said that we shall soon be going  
westward.

28 Fine day: may complain of chicken  
Mast up: see letters from Rachel & V.J. + Mr. Thompson.

29 Cooler: DMS inspection of Y. men.

Afternoon off: Davies calls from Sunhill.  
He feels that he would like to continue  
the ministry. D. is a poor chap + am  
sure he will do well.

30 Cool & looks like rain. Big convoy  
of ships in the mornng.

31 Bitter cold & wet: some discharges

1st June: Fine & fresh after the rain but muddy.

Busy in the morning: afternoon off: Do some  
washing. Take a walk through the golden corn-

fields with soldiers. Glorious evening  
fine sunset. Return to camp: day with magneto  
nets. D.M.O inspect all but those of net  
are used.

2nd Sunday: Work as usual in the morning  
2 more Dysentery cases in hospital making  
a total of 9 for the week. Fresh winds blowing  
easy afternoon. Write to Mirafon & to Miss  
Braser.

Attended Communion Service. few present.  
are no doubt to the fewer of patients  
Called out from service by George Price  
who is in trouble again. So he appears  
before Tribunal next Thursday. Try  
to slate his case on paper.

3 Fine day. Inspection of Y men.  
Nothing much doing: off in the afternoon  
have photo taken with Trung & Pickup.

Receive letter from Mael & son from  
D. Griffith who is still free & bitterly  
criticizes the Gov. He is obviously right  
& thoroughly agrees with his remarks.  
He is free to state them I am gaged.

Wrote to Mael & asked two lines  
of Welsh poetry for which my letter  
was sent to the Base Conv.

What will he say? wonder!

4. Busy morning: Visit Salminka with March  
in the afternoon: The town full of all sorts  
of men, soldiers of all nations: visit various  
shops but see nothing but toys for which  
exorbitant prices were charged.  
Manage to gain admission to the  
ancient St George Church which is being  
renovated restoration going on. did not  
get time to see all. Saw 3 8k funerals  
including apparently one of an officer  
judging by the many officers present.

Arrive back in camp about 7 p.m.  
Call over Martin has words with one of the  
men whom he threatens for A.R. swear  
me for witness.

- 5<sup>th</sup> Gloomy morning: Martin drops the case  
good thing for him. Rumours of Greeks  
taking Rufet Pass: not likely. Men  
return from charge of Air Camp. Reports  
not very favourable: had plenty of work  
to do.
- Wrote to D.G. Immunized for Cholera for  
the second time.

Raining day. 3 men leave for Blighty.

6<sup>th</sup> Fine day after the rain. Nothing  
much to do. Saw boats in again.  
Wrote to Mr R. Morgan. Rec'd letter 8<sup>th</sup>  
who is in hospital again

7<sup>th</sup> Glorious day. Easy day. Pay off in the afternoon.  
Showers of rain in the evening prevent my  
going for my usual walk.

8 Saturday Busy morning: Rec'd letter from  
Mahel & one from Queen's Paper from Abeyon  
Wrote to Jones. Talk of getting up some  
men to be sent to other hospitals for the  
summer. Take a short walk before  
breakfast - enjoyable walk.  
Sleep out - good night! 16th.

9 Sunday: Fine cool breeze blowing.  
Sgt Brooks & Staff Sgt. Helle going on leave  
to 33 Slat Rd for 5 days. My afternoon off.  
Attend service at 7.15. Singing good - sermon  
disappointing. Subject - Dogmeers.  
Point: That Christ taught general forgiveness is  
incorrect. He taught that we should  
forgive those who know no better.  
referring to the incident of the leper.  
But Christ did not teach that we should  
forgive those who sin knowingly.  
He did not forgive the Pharisee but denounce  
them.
