During the early 70s, the two main venues in Merthyr were Tiffany's and Sands (ex Palace Cinema). The artists that played at Tiffany's are too numerous to mention, and although many of these concerts were very well attended, a 1975 copy of the Merthyr Express reported less than 100 people turning out to see Shakin' Stephens and the Sunsets perform there. This raises the question, was live music starting to wane in Merthyr at the dawn of the new decade?

One certainty is that The Merthyr Express began to regularly advertise one particular iconic venue outside of the town in the 1970s, the Club Double Diamond in Caerphilly. With its starlit ceiling, the venue featured countless famous artists such as Lulu, Johnny Cash, Tony Bennett, Brotherhood of Man, Paul Melba, The Fortunes, Cliff Richard, The Hollies, The Supremes, The Drifters and many more.

However, despite this perception that there was less musical activity in Merthyr in the early to mid 70s than there was in the 60s, there were still many bands playing in and around the town. You will find below a snapshot of some of them.

Good News

Good news were formed after the Cheatin' Harts disbanded, comprising of three of its ex members, including Lynn Mittell.

Wild Honey

"I was guitarist vocalist with them. Bobby Watkins, in front, guitar and vocals. He had a great voice and sadly passed away about 20 years ago. Behind him was Alun Richards on Bass guitar. Behind Alun was Dougie Neagle [on drums], still going strong. We did the club circuit mostly, [but] also supported some big bands at the time, i.e. Hot Chocolate at the Glen Ballroom, Llanelli."

"Booked them for our engagement in Oct 74 and our wedding Mar 76. Fab times in the Dowlais British legion on Sunday nights."

Skint

"Gary Davies on the right together with Bobby Watkins and myself formed Chapter Five. Gary's Father kept the Plymouth Hotel in Pentrebach."

"Far right is my 1st cousin."






