

SKIFFLE BANDS IN MERTHYR TYDFIL



Back in 1957/8 not long after we added a banjo to the line up, a show called Noson Lawen was airing on Welsh television. Anyway Merthyr Tydfil was being represented on this entertainment show, it was being organised by Glynne Jones, who some years later became Musical Director for BBC Wales. We were asked to play backing music for a local lady called Gloria Dean who would sing 'Putting on the Style' in Welsh. They only wanted three of us so Dewi opted out & the three selected were Dave Francis, Ron Jones & myself. seem to recall we attended a studio in Pontcanna Cardiff. It was quite an experience as I was approaching 17 at the time. I remember Harri Webb, a well known local poet & Welsh nationalist also appeared. 99



Made popular by artists such as Lonnie Donegan, the skiffle craze hit the UK in the 1950s. The music is a mix of blues, jazz and American Folk music and unlike the musical expertise required by many Big Band musicians, skiffle proudly celebrated its amateurism, with washboards and tea chest basses being common. Like most other parts of the UK, Merthyr also had its own skiffle Bands, with the Dewi Peter's Skiffle Group and the Hill Billy Skiffle Group being two of them. Dewi Peter's Skiffle Group would eventually merge into Pete Lovis and the Tremeloes.
