Summer has arrived and the weather treated us kindly for the St Hilary Village Fete. Gale force winds on the preceding day eased to a gentle breeze allowing the tents to be erected so that villagers, families and visitors could enjoy everything on offer on the green, in the hall and the church.

ST HILARY CHURCH RESTORATION APPEAL

Any estate agent's description of St Hilary will include the words 'thatched pub and church' to describe its appeal. Sadly, this could soon become 'thatched pub and derelict church with wild churchyard.'

A real threat is confronting the church and the whole village: Repairs to the bell-tower are now so urgent that, if not carried out, the church authorities will need to declare the building unsafe for use. It could be closed and access to the churchyard stopped.



Unsurprisingly the church members, wardens and clergy have decided to launch an appeal. £75,000 is needed by May 2020 for the first stage of the work, of which £41,000 has been promised from the church's own

reserves and charitable trusts. Other funding applications are in progress. The congregation, although small, is digging deep into its own pockets, but the shortfall of £34,000 is large. Contributions from further afield are essential.

Soon a letter with details of how to contribute will be delivered to all homes. The first paragraph is a persuasive description of what the church means to St Hilary:

'The church needs the help of all who live here. The beautiful church has been an iconic building at the centre of life in the village for over 800 years, serving generations of people who have called this place home. It has borne witness to countless life events: baptisms, marriages and funerals. The rhythm of the year is punctuated by the festivals of the Church; Christmas, Easter, Harvest and Remembrance to mention but a few. Sunday worship is still an important part of the lives of many, and the church is open daily to welcome visitors and provides a place of stillness for prayer and contemplation which is valued by many. We firmly believe that the preservation of this building is essential not just to our Christian witness but also to the life of our village community. This will surely be of concern to all who enjoy life in this special village."


