## **Note on John Bevan**

Just inside the door of Holy Cross church is the memorial to the Bevan family: John Bevan who died in 1823, his wife Susanna, and their children - particularly John, who died on 7th January 1897, aged 98, and whose 'remains rest at Varese in Lombardy'. This latter is the man who - according to Iolo Davies in *A Certaine Schoole* - in his day must have been widely known both as a busybody and a benefactor.

Bevan was a Cowbridge solicitor, and an old boy of the Grammar School, who from 1847 onwards became keenly interested in the educational provisions of the town. We find him making a report to the Commissioners of Inquiry into the State of Education in Wales - who produced the notorious Blue Book which claimed that 'Welsh ignorance was the result of the existence of the Welsh language'. Bevan's concern, however, was not with the Welsh language but with the running of the Grammar School, and in particular with Jesus College's meanness in providing for the school - especially as the value of the estates left to Jesus College by Sir Leoline Jenkins had increased considerably. He objected to the absence of "free boys" in the school - and as the century progressed, continued to fight for the education of the poor. He endowed scholarships to the Grammar School, and together with Alderman Edward John campaigned for secondary education for girls. John Bevan paid for the land and for the original hostel (or boarding house) of the Girls' High School, currently the Sixth Form block of Cowbridge School. He endowed exhibitions for children between the ages of 8 and 11 at the Board School, and also gave £100 towards the building of the Cowbridge Institute.

## **Note on Philip Walton**

His work as a clockmaker is covered in *Clock and Watch Makers in Wales* by Iorwerth Peate

David Jones (in WAH Fisher, vol 42, p 179) stated: "Dr Philip Walton died of drink - a very great drunkard. Swelled so much in his coffin that they could not put the lid down. Had to deflate him with a butcher's knife. My father knew PW. He died 1769, aged 79."
