#### WHIT-SUNDAY.

The festivals follow each other with almost an incredible rapidity, and in a few days we shall be celebrating the feast of the Christian Pentecost. It is on old complaint, and will be a complaint until we give Ascension Day the place it should occupy in our minds and hearts, but the neglect of the observance of Ascension Day is no doubt due to the fact that it always falls on Thursday, but Whit-Sunday should find in us, by its observance, some atonement for the neglect. We do not keep the festival of the Christian Pentecost simply because the Church commemorates the descent of the tongues of fire, but because of the great and farreaching truth of the personal advent of God into the world of men becoming "immanent" (indwelling) as a sanctifying influence in the souls of men. Let us come together on this important festival at a time of so serious crisis, and make it a day of special pleading to God for those who have given their lives, and are giving them, as well as for ourselves, that this long and bitter world-upheaval may be replaced by an honourable and abiding peace, and a Christian reunion of the nations.

#### OBITUARY.

Once again the war has been brought home in all its reality to the parishioners by the death of Lieut. Hugh Aubrey Fairfield (Tom) Dunn as the result of a fatal accident at Monmouth. The distressing story is now well-known to us, but it has graven its sorrowful mark upon all who knew Lieut. Dunn. It seems but yesterday that we were sorrowing with the bereaved family at the Cross, Llanblethian, for his two noble brothers who had given their vigorous and promising lives for their King and Country, and it seems tragic in the extreme that again the family should be plunged into mourning as the result of an unfortunate mishap in the place where he was training to do his bit equally with them. Tom Dunn, as all knew him, was a young man of beautiful moral character, well regulated Christian conduct, a good all-round athlete as all young men should be, a manhood beautiful in its nature, snatched away at a moments notice, a loss to his friends, a loss to his family, to his regiment by which he was greatly beloved, and a loss to that little world in which he moved up and down always respected and trusted. Like his brothers Lieut. Frank and

Jack Dunn, we shall greatly miss Lieut. Tom Dunn. Our deepest sympathy goes out to Messrs. Fred and Guy Dunn and Miss Dunn in their sad

and distressing bereavement.—R.I.P.

Another instance of the cruelty of warfare, by land and by sea, and which has brought the war home to them as to thousands of other homes, is the loss to Mrs. Edmondes, The Old Hall, of her grandson Midshipman Wyndham Williams, son of Mr. and Mrs. Laurence Willisms, Bonvilstone, who lost his life in the going down of H.M.S. Russell which struck a mine in the Mediterranean Sea. Although this young and promising life was not known to the parishioners generally, still, there were many who could recall his stay at the Old Hall in his childhood days. In sympathising sorrowfully with Mrs. Edmondes and her family at the loss, we can only say in consolation, hard as it is to console, that we are grateful to noble parents for the gift of a worthy son, who heroically gave his life for his King and Country.—R.I.P.


