## Braved Bitter Winds To Honour The Dead

N spite of bitterly cold winds on Sunday there were excellent turn-outs at the Remembrance Day parades in the Vale of Glamorgan.

At Cowbridge the service at the cenotaph was attended by the Mayor and Corporation of the town, together with representatives of organizations and the general public.

The servict was conducted by the Rev. S. F. Mogford, Viçar of Llanblethian with Cowbridge, who was assisted by the Rev. Keith Jones, Pastor of Ramoth Baptist Church, Cowbridge.

After the observance of the two minutes' silence, wreaths of poppies were laid at the foot of the Cenotaph, the first being laid by the Mayor of Cowbridge, Coun. Glyn McNeil, J.P., on behalf of the Town, and the Chairman of the Cowbridge R.D. Council (Coun. A. J. Vincent J.P.) on behalf of the Rural District.

## LARGE TURN-OUT

The parade, marshalled by Inspector Gwyn Jones, included representatives of the R.A.F., Police, Fire Service, the British Legion (men's and women's sections), with their standards, the Girl Guides, Red Cross, and Boys Brigade. The marchers made their way to the Church of the Holy Cross where the service was conducted by the Rev. Mogford, assisted by the Rev. Jones and the Curate of Cowbridge, the Rev. A. K. Jenkins. The lesson was read by the headmaster of Cowbridge Grammar School, Mr Idwal Rees.

At Llantwit Major there was a large turn-out. especially of the younger generation. The homage was led by the chairman of the Parish Council. Coun. Gordon. Williams and the service was conducted by the Vicar of Llantwit Major, the Rev. J. A. Llewellyn Jones, assisted by the Rev Peter Williams, the Presbyterian Minis-

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ter, and the Rev. Malcolm Evans, the Congregational minister. The last post was sounded by an R.A.F. trumpeter.

The parade consisted of members of the Royal Air Force led by an R.A.F. hand, the British Legion, Boy Scouts, Girl Guides and the St. John Ambulance Brigade.

At the church the service was conducted by the Rev. Llewellyn Jones, and the lesson was read by Group Captain Kendrick, the Commanding Officer of 32 M.U. St. Athan, who was in charge of the R.A.F. Contingent.
