THE ADULT CENTRE

In 1974 the establishment of the County of South Glamorgan, and the publication of the Russell Report, brought a new philosophy of Adult Education to the Vale. The purpose of the innovation was by the appointment of full time Area Principals to bring into the local scene agents of the Authority to identify local needs, relate to local groups, and to make best use of local amenities.

It is generally appreciated that the multi-million pound assets in the shape of school buildings and equipment lie idle for the greater part of the year. It is an important aspect of the work of the Area Principal to unlock those facilities and to act in support of other ventures, relevant to the public interest.

The provision of day and evening classes in schools and elsewhere—in fact in any suitable accommodation—the housing of affiliated groups, i.e. those that merely wish to meet for their own purposes; all at a modest charge (at most 8 pence per hour, or .01 pence if you are in receipt of a pension or suffer hardship)—does much to meet the needs of the community. However, it happens that, all too frequently, for reasons of apathy, the domestic strait-jacket of routine—needs must be sought for and identified. For that reason suggestions for new courses, new ventures, new venues are always welcome.

It could not be more appropriate than that under the auspices of the Centre this Exhibition should be housed. My compliments are tendered most sincerely to the Cowbridge Rotary Club for initiating this venture and to all those groups that have contributed towards it. I would also like to note here the emergence of the Community Centre, Old Hall, Cowbridge, and the Arts Centre at St. Donats.

This has been an exciting year for Adult Education in the Vale, I estimate that 6 out of every 100 of the adult population attend the Centres in our first year of existence. I hope that you, if you are not already a member, will make the effort next time to seize the opportunities offered you.

Whatever your age, or inclination, you are never too old to learn, nor too insular to enjoy the good company and fellowship of others.
