BY OUR DRAMA CRITIC

The members of the Cowbridge Amateur Dramatic Society made their first appearance before the public in the Pavilion Cinema, Cowbridge, on Friday night with three one-act plays of varied character, each demanding of the players characterisation which was admirably accomplished.

It would be difficult to say which of the trio produced the best acting, for each story was worked up to a satisfactory, climax and there were none of the awkward pauses and uncertainties which might have been expected of a society on its first bow to the public. For this, no doubt, much credit is due to the producers, Messrs. Owen Phillips and E. O.

Rhoderick.

In "The Grand Cham's Diamond," a domestic comedy, the acting was natural and restrained, and all the points of the humorous dialogue were made by Gwyneth Thomas, R. N. Bird, Doris Miles, N. G. Brown, and M. H. Burston.

"BANQUO'S CHAIR"
"Banquo's Chair," by Rupert Croft-Cooke, is a crime story with a ghostly ending and a confession of murder, and here again the actors are equal to all the demands of the author. In this play A. C. Burgess, W. J. Thomas, D. G. Williams, A. T. Brown, and W. H. Yorwerth portrayed the characters and secured a fine climax.

Houghton's "The Stanley Departed " was acted by E. Howells, Joan Bird, W. J. Thomas, L. B. Miles, E. D. Lewis, and R. N. Bird.

The stage effects were cleverly managed and the elocution of the characters was audible throughout the theatre. In the intervels Mr. Tom Jones recited several pieces and Miss M. Davies's orchestra provided the incidental music.

There was a big audience, which was not lacking in its appreciation of dramatic

entertainment of unusual merit.
